One such workshop was held for the B.Com (Hons.) branch of Liberal studies on 20th April, 2015 titled the Modern Banking Practices. They also have games that increase numbering skills, color skills, etc. The hospital has a special Recreation Room in their premises where these games are carried out. Newspaper reading, physical exercising, meditating and praying are majorly emphasized as a part of the routine there. The hospital also provides the pa-

The mental hospital has a total number of 235 patients with 137 in acute ward, 84 in chronic ward and 12 in the general ward. They have a team of one clinical psychologist, some psychiatrists, occupational therapists and nurses. They also allow M.Phil students as interns there who again are made a part of their own team. When we visited the hospital recently, they were hosting interns from Gujarat Forensic Sciences University (GFSU), Gandhinagar with whom we got a chance to interact too.

tients with gym instruments and related facilities. Drawing and painting are promoted largely because they are not merely activities but also serve as a therapy for patients to vent their emotions and feelings. They have set up a mini library for the patients too.

The Hospital of Mental Health, Ahmedabad is



working very hard to make the lives of these patients better. They have established a Vocational Rehab centre wherein patients make different products, sell them and earn money. The money they earn is transferred to the patients' bank accounts by the hospital. They are into making of products like Incense sticks, mats, pottery items, boxes, etc. Apart from these, the hospital has special departments like Carpentry department, Binding and file making department, Handicrafts department etc. The hospital's efforts in raising these patients' abilities and making their ex-

istence more valuable are commendable.

The Hospital of Mental Health along with a NGO has established a Child Psychiatry department in their premises. They have a Day Care Centre for special children wherein they incorporate techniques of special education. They also organize Special Olympics for these special children that mainly include autistic children, children with ADHD, mental retardation and cerebral palsy. The student teacher ratio here is 20:1 which is unfortunately far away from the ideal ratio of 5:1. There is a great dearth of psychologists and special educators in clinical and other settings which also made us ponder upon the fact of how important our roles as students are, for the coming future.

This visit to the mental hospital helped us expand our knowledge horizons and also exposed us to the realities of life. We thank the School of Liberal Studies and the Hospital of Mental Health for making this visit possible for us.

Academía Speaks: Dr. Ranjana Harish

r. Ranjana Harish, Professor& Head Department of English, School of Languages, Gujarat University, interacted with the students of School of Liberal Studies. It was an enlightening and educational experience. The main aim of the lecture was to relate feminism with a number of aspects. Dr. Harish talked about feminism with regards to decision making. Wide range of examples from Shakespeare to Arjuna in Mahabharata were discussed during the session. She also talked about gender and the Bhakti Movement.

The session was quite motivational to say the least. "Always think about the two extremes before taking a decision and be prepared for the worst or the best. Take the decision and stick to it. If you do that, nothing is difficult in this world. If you follow this rule, you will become a successful professional in whatever field you chose to work," said Dr Harish.

As the discussion flowed from decision making to possibilities and consequences, she presented the example of Shakespeare. "Shakespeare did not go to any school, did not know any foreign language and never heard about theories. Then too his words have become immortal. If Shakespeare and Bernard Shaw can do it, anyone can become whatever one wants to. Shakespeare watched theatre for eight long years. And after all these years of just watching theatre, a

new person was born in him; a writer was born in him. People made fun of him, called him illiterate, the one who did not know theories but he didn't listen to them and see what he became. His madness was what made him what he is till date," explained Dr Ranjana, leaving the students aggravated with the life of Shakespeare. She furthermore went on to compare Shakespeare to Arjuna in the greatest Indian epic Mahabharata to take on the topic of dilemmas and decision making. The topic of Feminism was taken on then, linking Shakespeare and his writing to the Bhakti movement and Mirabai. Shakespeare had the king who helped him publish his works and bring it before people. But Indian Poetess Mira had no help. She went against the society's norms and did what she felt was right. Shakespeare was born after Mira. This proves she has survived much better than Shakespeare despite the conditions whatsoever.

According to Dr. Harish," feminism is not hating men, Feminism isn't a competition against man, Feminism isn't grabbing the power from men, Feminism isn't becoming like men, and Feminism isn't anti-manism. Feminism is going against the patriarchy and not the men. Treat every human being as a human being. That is the root thought." Thus the basic concept underlying feminism were taken into consideration and debated on.



iva Patel of SLS10 batch is one of those SLS alumnus who chose a foreign university for further studies. With the admission process going on for the next batch of SLS15, Dr. Nigam Dave wanted to have one of these alumni in flesh and blood to share their experience. SLS mirror got a chance to have a brief chit chat with Ms. Riva who is currently studying at the University of Sheffield, UK. Ms. Riva is also appointed as the brand ambassador of the University of Sheffield for India.

SM: You were the second batch of the new born School of Liberal Studies. Now we are ready for the seventh batch's admission. What changes, development have you seen here at SLS?

RP: When we took admission here, we had no idea what we were doing; we didn't have any

alumni to ask how the course would be like. We just had a mere 47 seniors and our batch also selected SLS because we weren't sure what we wanted to do. Now, we have all over India counseling sessions, entrance exams, and SLS is not unknown anymore. It's still comparatively new but not as untouched as it was during our times. At our times when we tell people we were liberal studies students they would just discount us thinking we won't be studying at all and would be bringing bad grades but now things have changed and liberal studies as a course has gained recognition and respect both. Plus, the numbers of applicants have highly increased because at our times we were overjoyed seeing a 100 applications and today you are getting more than 500 applicants and I'm very happy about that. But people do get confused about how we are studying a B.A/B.B.A or B.Com in liberal studies at a petroleum university, not only in India but also where I study, in the UK.

SM: How is your honours degree in bachelor of Liberal studies helping you?

RP: Having an Honours degree itself is a very valuable thing there in UK. We don't understand the value of the honours degree we get and think that doing a four year course is such a task but if you don't have the honours degree you any way have to do a bridge course there. Honours students have the privilege of directly getting admitted to any university without doing the bridge course.

Here, we used to study 8 subjects per semester for 2 years and at that time we didn't un-

derstand the value of learning all the subjects even if it didn't have any relevance with your future plans or interests, "I was interested in International Relations then why am I studying geography or environmental studies?" I just wanted to pass my end semesters to move on to the next semester. But though I'm studying hardcore International Relations there, somehow, in the long run I've ended up applying something or the other from each and every subject I've been introduced to in the first four semesters. Not only that, while conversing with students from other departments at the university you can talk something about their interests and profession and also give your inputs and it feels really good that you don't have knowledge limited to your subject only. It also boosts up your confidence and helps socialize easily. I agree that you won't remember everything you learnt in your first semester but somewhere at the back of your mind you do have some basic knowledge of the subjects you have been introduced to.

SM: Why did you choose a foreign destination for your post graduate?

RP: Why I chose to study in a foreign university and not a *desi* one was because my study area was International relations and there are a mere 4 to 5 universities where you can specialize in IR and JNU is the only one which is recognized but thinking on international level, JNU hardly stands anywhere in ranking. The department of politics at University of Sheffield where I'm enrolled is the fourth best in the UK, which is a higher rank than

the politics department of the Cambridge University and talking about world ranking, there was a world survey done where university of Sheffield stood on the 69th rank. Times higher education ranked us at 121st globally. Now imagine this university with so many rankings, accreditations stands at this rank, where would JNU stand? See, even I applied for JNU but the question is about where you stand after doing your masters. Frankly, if you have the opportunity and finance, opt for an international university with specialization in your subject, at least to a place which is recognized globally.

SM: Tell us something about your life there!

RP: The education system is totally different there. Teachers don't just come to the class and teach and go. They play the role of facilitators in the class sitting in the corner throwing questions to make sure the student led debate goes on. That is their job, otherwise it is all up to the student how much she wants to learn from the class. You discuss, you debate. For my course particularly, we have weekly debates and 10 articles to read to actively participate in the debate. So if you don't read and go to the class you won't understand a word of what would be going on. It's very practical, application based and thought provoking.

This is funny but they take plagiarism very seriously, (just like we do). For example, in my course I have to submit a 2500 word essay and another 3500 word essay each time to be written within 10 days time. After the first 2000 to 3000 words it is very difficult to

course, we use citations and references but it's not a cakewalk.

SM: What would you like to convey to the students of SLS as a senior?

RP: I would recommend every student of SLS to at least try and apply in a foreign university along with national ones to see what options you have. Here in India the options are way too limited in comparison with the options given by global universities. People there are doing what they really like and that too spontaneously; if you did your undergraduate in a subject but now your mind changed and you want to do a post graduate in a totally different subject, you can easily do it there. There is no set of rules to be followed to pursue anything. And I'm not talking just about UK or Sheffield particularly but globally, outside India the system is flexible and supportive in these regards. Your grades and GPA matter but only failures have to worry about it, others are judged on the basis of other important qualities of the student. For my course, I have 4 contact hours in a week, 2 hours a day 2 days a week. The remaining time we can study, do assignments, research, socialize, explore and practically apply. Part time job trend is very common there. Depending on your course the leisure time differs but you won't be packed studying all the time; leisure time and self exploration time is highly valued in these universities.

SM: Describe the contribution of SLS both on a personal and educational level.

write more because everything is original. Of RP: SLS has not just given me knowledge about these subjects and an honours degree- We had a bulk of seminars and conferences and workshops organized every now and then in PDPU. We would always participate and volunteer a lot; personally, volunteer. Tasks as small as giving a bouquet to the guest or escorting them would give you the opportunity to converse with them, make contacts, know about them, get confidence to talk to new people, in sum, all of formal and informal communication applied at one go. Here, Niyati ma'am particularly emphasized a lot about how you talk to people individually and with a mass, how to be presentable before everyone. We would hate wearing formals all the time but here it helped me a lot to be at least presentable to the audience. Other group members would come in hoodies and totally informal attire while presenting but I would be in my formals even though it is an ungraded assignment. It's what I've learned here, whatever the case you want yourself to look presentable and the presentation should go perfectly fine. Over all that society is very polite and sophisticated as I have observed but with the amount of varied people you have conversed with here at SLS it makes It easy for me to habituate myself with the culture and language, bringing a boost of confidence while talking to new people.
